Dear Parishioners & other friends,

"If faith schools are so bad, why do parents love them?

When Ruairi Quinn TD was Minister for Education, (2011 – 2014) he pushed his atheist agenda aggressively.

His successor, Jan O'Sullivan, (2014 – 2016) also toyed around with devolution of church run schools, but she may have had other matters to occupy her mind!

Richard Bruton TD, our current Minister for Education & Skills has now lent his ear to a more militant group who want schools to be pretty much 'disinfected' of any religious influence and input.

(As an aside. The most difficult time I have had in school management over the 25 years in Rathmichael School, was with a group of parents who were militant, anti-religious, anti-establishment, anti-every-blessed thing. One sweet mother spat at me and hissed as I took my young child by the hand into the school one morning. Who wouldn't detest being forced to open the doors of Rathmichael Parish School to such like again).

Richard Bruton offers the following bullet pointed options below as a way forward:

Rathmichael Board of Management and Select Vestry have responded thus:

"We have examined the four 'options' offered, but we deem that neither of these address the real issue of the provision of adequate **'capacity'**.

• **Catchment Area.** A catchment area approach would prohibit religious schools from giving preference to children of their own religion who live outside the catchment area over non-religious children or children of other faiths who live inside the catchment. (*There is currently no legal definition for what constitutes a catchment area for school admissions purposes*)



- Transference of children is the logical outcome.
 Children who have traditionally had an entitlement to

 a place in 'Protestant' schools will now be refused
 admission to same, thus transferring the problem.
- The Quota system would clearly impact adversely on the school Ethos. At present our school's ethos is attractive to very many parents in the area and we are invariably oversubscribed.
- 'Nearest School Rule' would exclude many children of the 'Protestant' tradition, given that the catchment area in 'Protestant' terms is already wide, again causing transference of the problem.
- Outright Prohibition This would have a detrimental effect on the character of the school by excluding children of 'Protestant' faith in many instances.

Faith based education is attractive to many parents. We would wish the provision of Educate Together schools for those who do not wish religion to be involved in the teaching of their children.

With the development and growth in Cherrywood and the growth of 30,000 in the community we would welcome more schools in the area. It would appear that *more* schools are required and not the changing of the nature or character of our current schools. Despite any changes, there will always be some person unhappy because their children did not get a place in a certain school."

CHURCH GROUNDS



The Select Vestry has realised for some time that the existing gravel outside the church is difficult for those with reduced mobility to manage, and has been considering how this situation might be improved.

Finding the solution was not as simple as one might think as any paving proposal needs to be designed to take account of drainage levels.

The Church is Protected Structure and any alterations to the gravel area have to have the approval of the Conservation Officer of Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council. These issues have all been resolved, tenders have been invited and work is due to start early in April.

The work will take 4 to 6 weeks and will inevitably be disruptive. There will be no access for cars to the church grounds during the work but pedestrian access will be provided.

Your cooperation in facilitating this work is requested – the finished job will be well worth the temporary inconvenience.

"It is abhorrent to suggest that parents 'sign a disclaimer' that states they understand and support the ethos of a school they may only be sending their children to because they lack an alternative," the submission states.



"The Broken Jug" by John Banville is a translation of "Der Zerbrochene Krug" by Heinrich von Kleist (1777 -1811).

The setting has moved from the original's location in the Netherlands to famine stricken Ballybog, a small town in the west of Ireland, in August 1846. In this cleverly calculated comedy a corrupt magistrate is forced to preside over a trial for a crime he himself has committed.
