#### Dear Parishioners,

For one reason and another I recently have found myself thinking about partnership. Ideally a partnership arrangement should be for the mutual benefit of the parties concerned as well as bringing about a situation where results are greater than the sum of the individual constituent parts. Such arrangements can also be of benefit where individuals or groups cannot by themselves produce the desired outcome. Marriage or co-habiting is probably the form of partnership that springs to mind most often when the word is used, however there are many and varied forms.

The publication of this magazine for example is a co-operative arrangement between a number of parties e.g. the contributors. However, the arrangement just doesn't end there for without the assistance of those who collate, put the material in and print it, we would just have a jumble of unconnected parts. There are bridge partners, business partners, partners in law, even partners in crime.

Another form of mutuality that might be considered a form of partnership is that of the provision of goods or services. We may not describe them as such but is one's doctor a partner in our healthcare? Am I a partner of the national broadcaster by reason of paying my television licence? Are teachers partners of parents and or the children they teach? Would you consider your gardener a partner?

The essential element for any of the above to be satisfactory for all parties concerned is based solely on one element – that of trust. Love, friendship, respect and credibility <u>may</u> play a part but trust is the foundation stone on which everything is built and without it there can be no reciprocity. When we are sure of the intentions of another and just as importantly, they of ours, opportunities for creation and development open up.

Who then in our lives today do we trust? Take a moment to consider who the significant people are in your life that you "partner" with. What do they mean to you? Do they know? Do you demonstrate that in any way? When was the last time you told "a significant other" that you are glad that they are in your life? Feel shy or embarrassed about doing that? Don't worry, just sit for a moment and think about them, offer up a prayer of thanksgiving for them and wait and see what happens. This is especially effective in cases where you have lost touch with someone who was once much more active in your life than now. Sceptical? Try it and see, if you feel it hasn't worked, what have you lost and if it does I have no doubt that something good will have happened.

Acts 29:1-14 And it came to pass, when Paul was at Corinth, he and certain disciples came upon a mob that was stoning an organist. 2. And Paul spake unto them. "What, then hath he done unto thee that his head should be bruised?" 3. And the people cried with one voice, "he hath played exceedingly loud." 4. Yea, in the singing of psalms he hath made our head to ring as if it were being beaten by an hammer. 5. Behold, he sitteth up high upon the loft and mighty art the pipes and great is the noise thereof that cometh out of the pipes therein. Though there be few of us below, he nonetheless playeth with all the stops: the Assyrian trumpet stop and the stop of the ram's horn and the stop that soundeth like the sawing of stones. And we cannot hear the words that proceedeth out of our own mouths. 6. He is wont to tosseth in variations that confuseth us mightily, and he playeth loud and discordant, and always in a military tempo, such that we have not breath even for to sing each verse. 7. Lo, he is a plague upon the faith and must needs to be chastised." 8. Paul upon hearing this, had himself picked up a small stone and was about to cast it, but he set it down and bade the organist come down thither from the loft. 11. And the organist gat himself down thence for to commune with Paul. 9. He was a man of middling stature and possessing a fine beard. 10. And Paul saith unto him, "What manner of communications are these that they say against thee?" 11. "And the organist cried unto him saying, "I heareth not them singing from whence I did sit and playeth even the louder to encourage them." 12. And Paul turned to the mob and said in a loud voice, "Let him who has never played an organ cast the first stone." 13. And they did cast stones until their arms were sore and heavy. And they that cast were an hundred and forty four men. And Paul bade the organist repent and he did. 14. And Paul spake unto the organist and said "Thou shalt take up the flute and play it for thirty and six days to cleanse thy spirit." And afterward they returned to Corinth every man for to sing songs unaccompanied, and then had coffee and were refreshed in the faith.

Note: scholars disagree as to the exact translation of verse 9. The description and even the gender of the organist is under dispute.

And finally....I came home last week to find my sister-inlaw's, husband's, daughter's cousin's, son's grandmother dancing on the dining-room table. "Good legs," I said. "Oh do you think so?" she replied. "Certainly," I said, "the sitting -room table would have given way long ago."

The expression "may you live in interesting times" certainly has relevance to the times of rapid change in which we currently live. How wonderful is it that we have something familiar to look forward to, an event that is continuing and consistent and brings about a sense of community and pleasure to many in the local areas. Of course, we're talking about the wonderful Rathmichael Fete, now in its sixth decade. This year, as always, we need your help with preparations leading into the Fete and your support on the big day.

What do we love the most about Rathmichael Fete? Is it meeting old friends, the clothing, jewellery or white elephant gems found amongst the stalls, or is it the appeal to our creativity that allows us to dream of the garden we can plant or the interior decorating schemes we can improvise or the stylish wardrobes we can create or the home baked goodies we can bring home to enjoy or the many books we can read over a fresh cup of coffee. Whatever it is, we can appreciate the positive atmosphere created and enjoy our Fete on a sunny (fingers crossed) Saturday afternoon.

This year we have lots of new changes. We have changed the layout of the tents to create more space and expanded some of our stalls so we can include more bargains for sale. So bring friends and family to join us on what is always a fun day.

We'll have an expansion of popular games on the astro turf, our vegetarian & vegan stand cooking up delicious noodles and Asian inspired dishes will be returning due to very popular demand. Last year they were a great hit. We will also have a 'bag stop' area where you can leave your baggage for a small fee, should you get exhausted lugging all your purchases around, you get the picture.

The fete is purely voluntary and relies on people to volunteer to help either the week before with sorting or on the day manning the stalls. Last year we struggled to have enough people to cover the 4 hours and other volunteers had to stay for longer. So please consider giving an hour or 2 of your time to make Rathmichael Fete bigger and better. We also have additional sponsorship from a number of local companies. If you are in a position to become a sponsor we would love to hear from you. Parents from the school will already have received an email regarding sponsorship. It costs 150 euro to become a sponsor and your company name and logo will be displayed on a sign outside the school for the 2 weeks following the Fete. It is a good way to promote your business as we will display your logo around the Fete and it will also be promoted on social media. Speaking of which....please like our Facebook page and forward to all your friends and families. Please contact the School Office if you want to become a sponsor.

As always, your contributions of time and goods to the stalls are vitally important. We welcome any genuine items that we can sell onwards and that can help with fund raising efforts for Rathmichael Parish Church & School. As you know, recycling laws have tightened up, which affects our efforts at the Fete. We are not in a position to accept anyone's unsellable junk, large furniture items, electrical goods, unwanted rubbish etc. Before you donate it, ask yourself would you or a friend buy it?? Is it damaged beyond repair and use? Is the appropriate place for this item in your own bin? We ask people contributing goods to avoid using the Rathmichael Fete skip as a dumping ground. A hugely expensive skip is hired each year for clean up after the Fete, a task made so much easier if the skip has not been filled with unusable rubbish beforehand. In fact, last year we had to hire extra skips to bin the unused items.

Each year we endeavour to improve the Fete and we trialed a Triage system where Fete committee members vetted goods being delivered in the run up to the Fete. This was hugely successful and we managed to segregate lots of items which were unsellable. Xmas trees and decorations, opened and partially used make up, torn clothes, broken toys, VHS tapes etc. were all refused which made sorting for those dedicated volunteers who give up their time all that much easier.

This year we will be making the vetting process a lot more formal so be warned. Only good quality products will be accepted.
