Dear Parishioner(s) and Others,

I am sure that the last thing you need right now is someone else telling what you ought to be doing in the face of the unparalleled crisis that overtaken the world. It is, however, incumbent on us all to pull together, make some sacrifices and change our behaviour. As Christians, one of the most powerful tools in our armoury is that of prayer and I would encourage you all to join in praying for all those affected by Coronavirus at home and abroad, particularly those in the most vulnerable groups and those who are feeling anxious about their own health or that of family. We think too of those who will be financially impacted, business owners and staff who may be laid off or put on short time working hours. We thank God for the work that is being carried out on behalf of all who are sick at this time and ask for his protection for the frontline healthcare, emergency services and humanitarian workers who are putting themselves at risk and working long hours in order to keep others safe. We can all play a part in keeping each other safe and looking out for our neighbours. I know that many of you will already be thinking about how you can care for others around you and can I encourage you to do so in appropriate ways as you follow the guidelines being given by government and health services.

I had hoped that we could maintain some level of weekly worship, but even the 8.30 am Sunday service has now had to be suspended for the time being in the interests of everyone's health and safety. I have no idea how this will impact in the weeks to come especially Easter Sunday, the pinnacle of the Church's year as we remember Christ's passion and death and celebrate his resurrection. The Select Vestry and I continue to monitor the situation closely and are looking at possible alternatives to regular worship in the church. Alongside the suspension of Sunday worship, we have had to cancel all activities in the Erck Hall and Holy Communion at home, and we very much regret the inconvenience all this has caused. It is likely that the planned activities for the weekdays of Holy Week will not now take place.

Of the occasional offices (weddings baptisms, funerals) the one that is possible to be affected is the latter. I have been in touch with a local funeral director who tells me that he would be recommending to any family that is bereaved in the coming weeks and planning a service in Rathmichael Church, to limit the number of people attending to a maximum of 30. He has also told me that the service can be conducted from their premises in Bray with live televised streaming and/or recording of the service for later viewing. If you should be unfortunate enough to suffer a bereavement, please get in touch with me straight away so that together we can make the necessary arrangements.

As of next Sunday 29th March you will be able to access the 11.00 a.m. service from Rathmichael Church on YouTube. Many thanks to our wardens, Paul Barron and Richard Marshall, who have set up this facility for us. Please join us. You will find the link to the YouTube channel on the next page.

Another positive note is that a number of people have volunteered offers of help by way of collecting/delivering groceries and or medicines/prescriptions from the pharmacy. Should you wish to avail of this please get in touch with our parish secretary, Anne Thompson 086 893 7067 or (01 2824202) who is co-ordinating this service.

We will do all that we can to maintain communication with you and would ask that you play your part in assisting us with that task. Information, as it becomes available, will be posted on the parish website or sent via email. If you do not have access to a computer, perhaps you can ask a friend or family member to keep you updated as to what is being posted.
