RATHMICHAEL PARISH SUNDAY CLUB - LOOKING BACK - ANNOUNCEMENTS

In November, we concluded our exploration of early stories from the Old Testament by looking at the lives of twin brothers, Jacob and Esau. Then, beginning our Advent adventure early, we ventured into the New Testament, learning that an angel announced, to Zechariah's absolute amazement, that his wife Elizabeth would give birth to a son who would bring an important message. He was called to prepare people's hearts for the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. Centuries beforehand, the prophet Malachi had spoken of this special messenger. Even though Zechariah knew about this prophecy, he got quite the shock when he was given the news that this person was to be his son. In due course John, known to us as John the Baptist, was born. The next big announcement we learnt about was from the angel, Gabriel. He appeared to Mary and revealed God's plan that she would have a baby called Jesus. He would fulfil the prophecies made by Isaiah long ago. He would be both a king, and a suffering servant who would redeem all who trusted in Him. Born just like any other baby, this was God Himself arriving amongst His people, to live alongside them, and ultimately, to rescue them.

LOOKING FORWARD - EVEN MORE ANNOUNCEMENTS

Heading into December we anticipate Christ's coming with an air of excitement. We will encounter shepherds looking after sheep on the hills outside Bethlehem who are startled by an angel bearing good news of joy for all people. Before long a choir of angels arrive singing praises to God for His wonderful gift. Intrigued, the shepherds determine to set off and see the Saviour of the world. We will learn of Simeon, a man who loved God and who longed for the Messiah's coming, being overjoyed as he takes the young child Jesus in his arms. He prays over Him in gratitude to God because He has seen the One who will be a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of God's people Israel. He is thrilled that God's Salvation has arrived.

Christmas Unwrapped – Rathmichael Nativity Trail brings Christmas story to life

Talented and imaginative parishioners of Rathmichael brought the Christmas story to life in the grounds of their church on Saturday afternoon (December 10). Despite freezing weather, they welcomed almost 200 people to the 'Christmas Unwrapped: Nativity Trail'.

The trail brought people through the whole story of Christmas, starting with Eve and the Prophets and continuing to the Angel Gabriel, the Inn Keepers, the Shepherds, the Three Wise Men, King Herod to the scene of the Nativity.

'Trailing' has become popular amongst churches as a way to engage children and families since Covid arrived. In Rathmichael they have enjoyed running trails over the last couple of years and with such positive responses to these, they decided to think about how we would approach one this Christmas that used the full space available – the church grounds as well as the church and its buildings.

"Around the same time, we were planning our Christmas services and events we wondered how we could approach them in a fresh, creative way so as to capture the wondrous and amazing message of the First Christmas, particularly for the younger members of our congregation," explained Cherith Hanily who coordinated the trail. "The idea of our 'Christmas Unwrapped: Nativity Trail' began as we merged the idea of a trail and the familiar lessons read at our traditional Carol Service."

"We constructed a trail to explain the Christmas story, with talented parishioners acting as characters from the Bible at each stop, interacting with participants to bring the story to life. The trail covered the grounds and church, breaking the story into memorable chunks as the children gathered stickers to complete their Nativity Passports. The trail concluded with a chance for families to enjoy refreshments together and partake in Nativity themed games and crafts before concluding with a choice of Christmas book to take away," she said.

The Rector, the Revd Sean Hanily added that they were delighted with the response. "It was wonderful to welcome so many people and we were encouraged that people of all ages enjoyed engaging with the Christmas story in a new and captivating way," he said.

RATHMICHAEL WALKERS

On the last Saturday of November seven of the Rathmichael Walkers met up at the Church for our outing. We had met up in October to do the same outing but it was cold and wet and miserable so we decided instead to have a coffee and a chat and try again the next month. This was the second attempt.

Saturday November 26th dawned grey and wet. Not a great omen, but seven intrepid Walkers decided to "go for it"! We drove to Ashford and parked at Mount Usher Gardens. The rain continued. We walked in the Gardens for an hour and a half. Leaves had fallen since the last time I had been down, but there were still some lingering patches of colour, mostly on the Japanese Maples. The huge old trees have a different type of beauty when in their winter skeletal garb, tall branches reaching for the skies.



Mount Usher Gardens, all 22 acres of it, in a very sheltered area on the River Vartry, has an amazing selection of mature trees, magnolias, azaleas, ericas, cornus, eucalyptus, acacias, palms, beech and very interesting looking evergreens from the antipodes. The map we had for reference gave us information on the numbered trees, giving the names, species, country of origin and date of planting in many cases.

It is a most beautiful place to visit at any time of the year and November in the rain is possibly the worst time to choose. However, we were all quite happy with our morning's exercise. We enjoyed our "Forest Bathing" - although rain is not an essential part of this experience, it does lend an extra dimension! It is calming and relaxing to commune with nature in a slow stroll through the trees.

When we had walked to the South end of the Gardens, we crossed the river, which was in full spate, the weirs were magnificent. So we walked by the river to the North end, crossed another bridge and down to the exit point.

We had decided to go to the Chester Beatty for lunch. A very good choice as they have open log fires, it's warm and the soup and chowder were just the perfect recipe to warm us all up. So, despite the rain, the wet coats, umbrellas and shoes, we all enjoyed our outing to Mount Usher Gardens (in the November rain!)

We are doing some research for our next walk in January, all suggestions will be considered!











Bishops' Appeal is the Church's World Aid and Development Programme. It was set up by the Bishops of the Church in response to the commands in the Bible to bring good news to the poor and relief to the suffering. The aims of this role are

- to educate the Church at home about the needs and concerns of people in the less developed world and the causes of poverty;
- to encourage Church members to examine the reasons for the problems facing the less fortunate in the world and to consider what we can do to change conditions;
- to reach out in God's name to those who need our help;

to encourage informed prayer and prayerful action aimed at strengthening the poor; to raise the funds needed to allow Bishops' Appeal to support development projects and alleviate the suffering caused by disasters, both natural and manmade.

Bishops' Appeal works through partner Non-Governmental Organisations and Mission Agencies to implement Christ's "Mission Statement" to feed the hungry, lift the burden of poverty from the poor and bring freedom and hope to the oppressed. It does not fund development and emergency work directly. Our partners have the local knowledge and resources to ensure that projects for which they apply for funding are of maximum benefit to the peoples and areas in which they work.

Bishops' Appeal contributes to relief of suffering in time of emergencies whether natural or man-made. However, our main concern is to support ongoing development in the fields of sustainable agriculture, health, including HIV/AIDS, and education in many parts of the world. We aim to enable people to have more control over their own lives and futures so that they are less dependent on others than they are today.

Emergency responses such as food, water, shelter and medical supplies have been made in South Sudan (CMS Ireland), Yemen (Tearfund Ireland) Sierra Leone (Christian Aid) Caribbean Region (Christian Aid) Ethiopia: Self-help groups to build resilience and reserves, as response to drought and famine. (Tearfund Ireland).

The Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development has committed money from its emergency funds to assist with the humanitarian response to the current crisis in Ukraine. Bishops' Appeal is partnering with Habitat for Humanity Ireland and Christian Aid, and encouraging parishes across the island to contribute to our response to help people seeking refuge.

Jenny Williams, Chief Executive of Habitat for Humanity Ireland, remarked: "UNHCR reports that over 500,000 people fled Ukraine into neighbouring and nearby countries from 24th February to 1st March. We have strong programmes in Poland, Hungary and Romania and our European office is in Slovakia so we are on the ground responding. "Habitat is meeting UNHCR daily and co-ordinates with governments to add value and ensure there isn't duplication of effort. Colleagues from Hungary and Romania spent the weekend at their borders. In Romania, the need was to provide additional heat for a camp – even more important given that there was more snow at the weekend and people were cold. More broadly our focus is on supporting the shelter needs of refugees, ensuring that more people can feel safe. We will support them for the long term.

ANNUAL REGISTER OF VESTRY PERSONS

Each year in the month of January every Church of Ireland parish revises its register of parishioners.

People who have become new members of the Parish and parishioners who have reached the age of eighteen are entitled to become registered members of the Parish (referred to as registered vestry members).

In a similar manner, names of those who have ceased to be registered vestry persons through death or having moved away from the Parish, are deleted.

To be so registered entitles one to vote at the Annual Easter Vestry Meeting, the Parish AGM. An up-to-date register is also helpful when the Church of Ireland carries out a census of its members. Please therefore, if applicable, complete and return the form below to a Churchwarden or the before 15th January 2023.
